

Tortoise Sustainable and Social Impact Term Fund (TEAF)

4Q 2024 QUARTERLY COMMENTARY

TEAF's NAV return for the quarter was -4.93% and market return was -6.04%. This compares to global infrastructure (measured by S&P Global Infrastructure Index) which returned -2.63%.

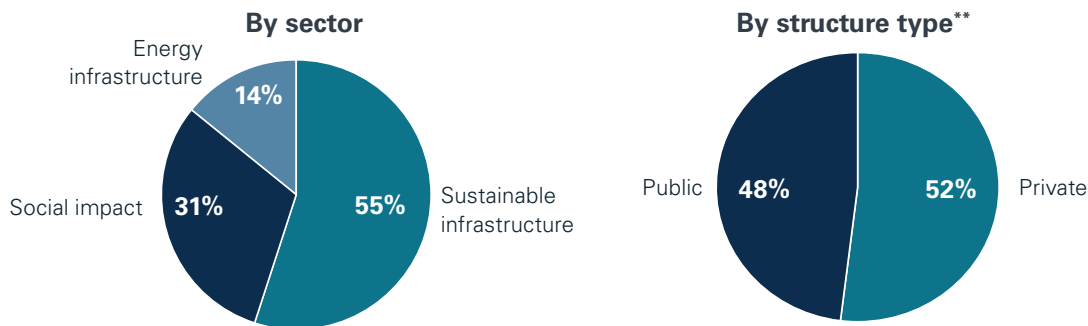
- **Listed sustainable infrastructure:** The fund's lower U.S. allocation and higher exposure to utilities hurt performance, as rising bond yields and election uncertainty weighed on the sector. The U.S. 10-year Treasury yield rose to 4.6%, driven by fiscal concerns and policy uncertainty following Donald Trump's election win, which boosted U.S. equities but pressured interest-rate-sensitive stocks. Renewables-exposed and regulated utilities underperformed due to concerns over policy changes and rising yields, though some U.S. utilities like Vistra benefited from tightening power markets and growing electricity demand.
- **Listed energy infrastructure:** The energy infrastructure sector outperformed in Q4, with the driven by disciplined capital allocation, strong balance sheets, and growing demand for natural gas infrastructure, particularly for data centers and liquefied natural gas (LNG) exports. Key contributors included Targa Resources, benefiting from strong Permian Basin volumes, and Cheniere Energy, which saw positive momentum from increasing LNG demand and regulatory expectations.
- **Private social infrastructure:** TEAF completed one direct investment in the social impact portfolio during the period, investing in Ivy Classical Academy, a new public charter school in Prattville, Alabama, that opened in August 2024 as the area's first no-cost classical school, drawing strong enrollment demand. The financing supported building acquisitions, renovations, and classroom equipment, ensuring a strong foundation for its planned expansion. There were no realizations during the quarter.
- **Private sustainable infrastructure:** In Q4 2024, TEAF's private sustainable infrastructure investments saw mixed developments. One Energy filed for an IPO under the name One Power Company, while TEAF's debt investment in World Water Works was fully repaid. TEAF's solar assets faced some operational challenges, including inverter issues and project delays. Key projects, such as rooftop solar in Puerto Rico and Saturn Solar Bermuda 1, are expected to progress in early 2025.

As of December 31, 2024, TEAF's total direct investment commitments were approximately \$111 million or approximately 51% of the portfolio. Tortoise Capital is conducting an ongoing strategic review of the investment strategy for the Tortoise Sustainable and Social Impact Term Fund. This review, first announced in September 2024, includes evaluating the impact of blending private and public investments within a closed-end fund structure.

Investment strategy

TEAF seeks to provide a high level of total return with an emphasis on current distributions. TEAF provides investors access to a combination of public and direct investments in essential assets that are making an impact on clients and communities.

Closed-end funds, unlike open-end funds, are not continuously offered. After the initial public offering, shares are sold on the open market through a stock exchange. Shares of closed-end funds frequently trade at a market price that is below their net asset value. The Investment Committee of the fund's advisor allocates and reallocates assets among the various asset classes and security types in which the fund may invest. The fund is non-diversified, meaning it may concentrate its assets in fewer individual holdings than a diversified fund. Therefore, the fund is more exposed to individual stock volatility than a diversified fund. The fund will have a limited period of existence and will dissolve 12 years from the effective date of the initial registration statement. Its investment policies are not designed to return to common shareholders their original net asset value or purchase price. Investing in specific sectors such as social infrastructure, sustainable infrastructure and energy infrastructure may involve greater risk and volatility than less concentrated investments. The S&P Global Infrastructure Index is designed to track 75 companies from around the world chosen to represent the listed infrastructure industry while maintaining liquidity and tradability. To create diversified exposure, the index includes three distinct infrastructure clusters: energy, transportation, and utilities.

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
